"Get to Know the STO" -- What is the STO?

A School Tuition Organization or STO is a not-for-profit organization that provides financial support to families seeking a non-public school education. The Our Faith STO supports 47 schools across the Archdiocese of Dubuque and helps over 3,000 students each year. The STO program started in lowa in 2008 when the legislature provided an incentivized income tax credit for individuals or businesses who donate. The credit currently stands at 75%, making it the "Best Tax Credit in Iowa" For more information, visit www.ourfaithsto.org.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT - The Don Bosco English Department is focused on helping our students become better readers, writers, and communicators. We strive to help our students improve these skills so that no matter what their future path is, they have the means to communicate fluently with others.

The Freshmen are focused on a variety of different skills including reading, writing, and grammar and usage. They will work on shoring up skills they have previously learned and building on them.

Sophomore students are jumping right into their short story unit. They are working hard at mastering the elements of a short story by practicing plot diagrams with their own writing.

Juniors are focused on American literature and improving their writing skills. We are starting the year with a suspense short story unit, focusing on the use of suspense in writing and how story elements help to contribute to that.

This year, the seniors had the option of taking Literature and Composition or our new offering, AP (Advanced Placement) Literature and Composition. We are excited to add this class to our curriculum. Students in AP will focus on the big ideas and enduring understandings which include character, setting, structure, narration, figurative language, and literary argumentation. They will have opportunity to take the AP exam in May to receive college credit for the course. The students in Literature and Composition this year are focusing on a variety of literature types and writing types.

COUNSELOR NOTES - As Don Bosco HS's Guidance Counselor, August is always a busy time in the Guidance Office. We are off to a very good start as students are scheduled in their classes.

<u>COLLEGE CLASSS</u>: With more students taking College Classes this year, it can be challenging to get all their required classes in, but this has been managed. There are 17 students attending the Career Center plus an additional four students attending the CAPS Program. 24 students are taking an online Hawkeye or UNI College Class. 13 students are taking Hawkeye College Western Civ II with Mr. Stewart.

<u>AP CLASSES:</u> This is our first year offering Advanced Placement (AP) Classes at Don Bosco. Four students are taking AP US History, four are taking AP US Government, and 2 are taking AP Comp and Literature. In May, these students will have the opportunity to take their Subject AP Test to qualify for college credit. In addition, we have five students taking the online AP Calculus class through the U. of Iowa Belin-Blank Department.

SENIORS-APPLY TO COLLEGE: Seniors should be thinking of applying to their college(s) of choice soon this Fall. The three Iowa Universities prefer that students apply soon, as the Universities assign dormitory assignments usually in order of acceptance date. Seniors that are applying to a Community College, such as Hawkeye or Kirkwood, should also be applying this Fall.

SENIORS & FINANCIAL AID: Colleges will be preparing Financial Award letters in February for students that might include their merit academic awards; therefore, Seniors with their Parents should plan on having their College Application and their Financial Aid form (FAFSA) completed by December. There is no deadline for the FAFSA, but most colleges want it done before February.

COVID-19 and K-12 School Update for Fall 2021

Vaccination

While not required, vaccination for everyone who is eligible continues to be the most effective way to prevent COVID-19 illness and stop the spread of COVID-19.

Testing

Individuals (including students, teachers, and other staff) can seek testing through their normal healthcare channels or through other sites that provide testing services (i.e., local pharmacies).

School Illness Reporting

IDPH continues to ask K-12 schools to report when >10% of students are absent due to illness. When >10% absenteeism is reported, IDPH will contact the Local Public Health (LPH) department in the county where the school administrative offices are located. Public health will contact the school to provide best practices and support tailored to the specific types of illnesses being reported.

Masks and Cloth Face Coverings

HF 847, signed by Governor Reynolds on May 20, 2021, prohibits a school district from adopting or enforcing a policy that requires employees, students, or the public to wear a mask while on school property. As such, masks must be optional for students, teachers, and visitors.

Frequently Asked Questions

Is IDPH currently performing COVID-19 positive case investigations for all positive reports or conducting contact tracing for COVID-19 exposed persons?

No. IDPH has adjusted COVID-19 surveillance to follow the influenza model; state case investigation and tracing efforts for COVID-19 now focus on outbreaks and vulnerable populations. Just like with other public health activities, these efforts will be continuously evaluated and adjusted as needed.

Will IDPH issue isolation and quarantine orders for COVID-19 positive or COVID-19 exposed students, teachers, or other staff members?

No. IDPH is not currently issuing isolation and quarantine orders for COVID-19 positive or COVID-19 exposed individuals.

Can LPH departments require schools to perform case investigations or conduct contact tracing on their behalf? No. While some LPH are continuing to pursue case investigations, LPH cannot require schools to perform case investigations or contact tracing. School nurses do have a legal duty to assist a local board of health in a disease investigation. See 641 IAC 1.7.

Can lowa schools require that masks be worn by students, teachers, other staff members, and visitors?

No. HF 847, signed by Governor Reynolds on May 20, 2021, prohibits a school district from adopting or enforcing a policy that requires employees, students, or the public to wear a mask while on school property.

Iowa's STO credit the best tax break in the state

If you could receive a 75% rebate reducing what you owe in Iowa income taxes, would that sound too good to be true? Well, it is not; the best tax credit in Iowa is a 75% tax credit given for donations to an STO.

So what is an STO? An STO, or School Tuition Organization, is a charitable organization that distributes tuition grants to lowand middle-income families struggling with the expense of sending their children to non-public (aka parochial) schools. There are 12 highly regulated STOs in the state of Iowa. The Our Faith STO (www.ourfaithsto.org), of which I am the director, supports families within the boundaries of the Archdiocese of Dubuque. This large 30-county area of northeast Iowa has 47 parochial schools, which in the 2020-21 school year educated 8,780 students.

On May 20, the best tax credit in Iowa got better when education legislation passed, increasing the STO credit from 65 to 75%. Let's uncover how this 75% credit works and why donations to STOs deserve the best tax credit in Iowa.

The financial scenarios are simple. For example, if you're an Iowa business owner who pays state taxes, you could donate \$100,000 to our STO and reduce your taxes owed by \$75,000. On the other hand, if you're more like the average Iowa taxpayer, you could donate \$1,000 or even \$100 and receive a \$750 or \$75 credit. Donations made in cash, as IRA distributions, appreciated securities, or even gifts of grain all qualify. These monies then flow through the STOs, such as the Our Faith STO, which distributes them to income-qualifying families seeking a Catholic education.

So why is the STO Tax Credit the best in Iowa? First of all, it provides the most significant benefit back to the donor. There are numerous other highly recognizable tax credits in Iowa related to alternative energy, business development or

philanthropic areas, but none provides a higher percentage of credit. In 2021, the state's 12 STOs were collectively allocated \$15 million in tax credits incentivizing this charitable giving. The Our Faith STO receives \$4.2 million in credits. Unfortunately, these credits are limited, so when Iowa taxpayers claim them all, they are gone.

So why do STOs and their families deserve such a benefit? Simply put, non-public schools are good for the economy. They create jobs for teachers and support staff, who in turn pay taxes to support public schools. They lessen the burden on the public school system, which would have challenges with an influx of parochial school students, and the non-public schools save the Iowa taxpayer money.

Annually, Iowans pay an estimated \$9,862 to educate each K-12 student in the public school systems (according to National Center for Education Statistics from 2020). If all 8,780 students covered by the Our Faith STO schools flooded into the public school system, taxpayers would be paying an estimated \$86.2 million annually to educate them. Therefore, the \$4.2 million in tax credits afforded our STO is of great value to taxpayers.

Lastly, and most importantly, the faith-based traditional Christian values taught in parochial schools pay dividends on which no one can place a price. The health of our Catholic schools is vitally important. Whether you feel this way or not, maybe 2021 is the year you start taking advantage of this 75% tax credit. We encourage you to consult with your tax or financial adviser for more details. Help a family, help our Catholic schools, and help yourself by donating to your STO.

- 3. Class composite (Display in hall)- vertical shot

Most studios already have these specifications but please make sure the picture turned in for the yearbook is:

- -Photos must be vertical
- -Color photo please

We cannot guarantee your senior's picture will be included in the yearbook or the class composite if you don't make this deadline. PLEASE make your photographer aware of the deadline. Don't assume they know it. **Often pictures that are taken in the fall have difficulty making this deadline. Please be aware of this.**
